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Arts and Sciences Administration

School of Arts and Sciences

The School of Arts and Sciences launched on July 1, 2025, after more than two years of development, refinement, and endorsement by Arts and Sciences Faculty, governance committees, and staff representatives. Important features of the school's design include: a dean focused solely on the Arts and Sciences and supported by a strongly coordinated cabinet of A&S-specific senior leaders; dedicated support from Advancement, Admissions and Communications; and increased agency and transparency around budgeting.

Arts and Sciences Office of Finance and Administration (ASOFA)

The ASOFA supports all aspects of financial transactions and reporting. Each faculty member has a designated analyst as their primary contact within the Arts & Sciences Finance Center (ASFC), the ASOFA team which supports faculty, who can answer questions about faculty account reporting, expense reimbursements, and [internal awards opportunities](#) for faculty at all levels.

Dean of Faculty

Academic Departments/Programs

Arts and Sciences includes 41 departments and programs, organized into four divisions: Arts and Humanities, Interdisciplinary Studies, Sciences, and Social Sciences. Arts and Sciences Finance and Research Administration

The Fiscal Office serves A&S faculty as a liaison to other administrative offices, provides direct assistance with a wide variety of transactions, and interprets college policies and procedures. Their purview includes staff compensation, department operating budgets, external funding, and endowment distributions. Each academic department and program has a [designated grant manager](#) for external awards and fellowships.

Office of the Chief of Staff for Administration and Advancement (OCOS)

The office helps manage the day-to-day operations of the Dean of Faculty Office. It also assists with cultivating donors and stewarding hundreds of A&S endowed funds.

Dartmouth Administration

Office of the President

The president of Dartmouth is responsible for establishing and pursuing an academic vision for the institution as a whole. The president reports to the Board of Trustees and oversees a senior leadership team that encompasses the Arts and Sciences, professional schools, and all other executive and administrative operations of Dartmouth.

Office of the Provost

The provost is Dartmouth's chief academic and budget officer, responsible for overseeing the overall academic integrity of the institution. All official policies can be found in the Provost's [Policy Portal](#). The Finance Office also maintains a helpful page of [resources for new employees](#).

Institutional Diversity & Equity (IDE)

Equal Opportunity, Accessibility, and Title IX

Human Resources

Information, Technology and Consulting (ITC)

Libraries

Guarini School of Graduate and Advanced Studies

The Guarini School supports graduate students and postdoctoral fellows across campus, as well as the faculty who work with graduate programs.

Professional Development Opportunities

Senior Advisor for Faculty Development, Diversity, and Inclusion

The Senior Advisor in Arts and Sciences supports recruitment, retention, career development, and leadership programming for faculty. Regular programming includes a year-long series for new Assistant Professors and periodic workshops. Teaching Resources

Dean of Faculty Office

In addition to summarizing resources from around campus, the Dean periodically invites proposals for innovative courses, especially those that involve team teaching.

Office of the Registrar

Academic Advising

Faculty in the Arts & Sciences are encouraged to advise students both in their subject matter and in the liberal arts and majors/minors. The office of Academic Advising (DUE) supports faculty in their advising endeavors.

- In AY 26–27, 20 faculty are supporting a Liberal Arts Advising pilot model that will bring specialized training and resources to faculty engaged in advising from pre-matriculation through major declaration. A full rollout is anticipated for AY 27–28.
- In AY 27–28, the Office of Academic Advising will begin to build out a structure to match students interested in discussing majors, minors, research, off-campus study, departments/programs, etc. with faculty who have indicated interest in more *ad-hoc* advising opportunities.
- Likewise, Academic Advising plans to develop infrastructure and advising resources to better support consistency in major and minor advising, handoff when students change their majors, and timely major declaration.

Dartmouth Center of Advancement and Learning (DCAL)

DCAL offers programs for enhancing pedagogy, course design, and accessibility.

Learning Design and Innovation (LDI)

This technology office directly supports Canvas, the Learning Management System provided for all courses. If you are new to Canvas, or would like to learn more about efficient course administration and grading strategies, [book a remote consultation](#).

Classroom Technology Services

Services to ensure classrooms are suitably equipped and functional to meet the needs of the education experience. The office provides both self-service resources and individual consultations and trainings.

Institute for Writing and Rhetoric (IWR)

The IWR is home to the First-Year Writing Program and the Speech Program. It also supports the First-Year Seminar curriculum offered in each department/program. IWR provides tutoring and coaching for students at all levels.

Academic Skills Center

The ASC provides tutoring and coaching to students at all levels; faculty can also work with ASC for group tutoring for large classes.

Center for Social Impact

In addition to many student programs, the Center works with faculty who wish to integrate a Social Impact Practicum into their courses.

Fannie and Alan Leslie Center for the Humanities

The Center offers [Humanities Lab Course Development Grants](#) for humanities courses.

Nelson A. Rockefeller Center for Public Policy and Social Sciences

The Center offers *Faculty Classroom Enhancement Grants* for social science courses.

John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding

The Center offers *Faculty Course Development & Enhancement* for international topics.

Ethics Institute

The Institute offers *Classroom Enhancement Grants* for topics related to ethics.

Research Resources

Dean of Faculty

All Faculty

- **Internal Funding:** Some programs are allocated automatically according to faculty rank; others are open to application.
- **External Funding:** Through the Prestigious Awards Program, the Dean provides salary support for faculty awarded external fellowships that support full-time research. Various conditions apply depending on the terms of the external award.

Assistant Professors:

- **Burke Research Initiation Awards:** New tenure-track faculty apply in their first term for this start-up award.
- **Junior Faculty Fellowships:** For faculty who have been re-appointed (third year review).

Associate and Full Professors:

- **Faculty Research and Professional Development Funds (FRPDF):** An annual fund to support scholarship and engagement in professional societies.
- **Burke Sustaining Excellence Award:** Research and professional development award for recently promoted and tenured faculty.
- **Scholarly Innovation & Advancement Awards:** These funds support new and promising initiatives that would not be rapidly or routinely funded by other mechanisms.
- **Senior Faculty Grants:** One-term grant to pursue research in a new field outside of an accustomed area of study.
- **Wilson Faculty Research Fellowship:** One-term grant to pursue research, teaching, and writing in the fields of biography, history, and government.

Research Resources Centers and Institutes

Fannie and Alan Leslie Center for the Humanities

Faculty programs in the humanities include event co-sponsorship, research project grants, manuscript reviews, and research working groups. The center also supports students, postdoctoral fellows, and non-tenure-track faculty.

Nelson A. Rockefeller Center for Public Policy and Social Sciences

Faculty programs in the social sciences include project grants and research working groups. The center also supports student programs in public policy and leadership, and non-tenure-track faculty.

The Neukom Institute for Computational Science

Faculty programs related to computation in all disciplines include project grants, working groups, and workshop events. The center also supports undergraduate and graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, and non-tenure-track faculty. The Neukom Institute is also home to the [Susan and James Wright Center for the Study of Computation and Just Communities](#).

The John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding

Faculty programs related to international studies include event co-sponsorship, manuscript reviews, and travel grants. The center also provides programming for students, postdoctoral fellows, and non-tenure-track faculty.

Ethics Institute

Faculty programs related to ethics include research grants, manuscript reviews, and event co-sponsorship. The institute also provides programming for students, postdoctoral fellows, and non-tenure-track faculty.

Arthur L. Irving Institute for Energy and Society

The institute has a [funding and resources](#) for projects related to energy and society, open to faculty of all ranks, postdoctoral fellows, and staff. They also have a range of student programs.

Institute for Black Intellectual and Cultural Life

The IBICL is a research center rooted in the study of the Black diaspora. Building on the strengths of Dartmouth's current Black faculty and staff, the Institute hosts visiting scholars, artists, activists, and postdocs and provides grants for Dartmouth faculty who are undertaking major research and creative projects related to the Institute's research themes.

Arts Integration Grant Initiative

The [Hopkins Center for the Arts](#) and the [Vice Provost for Research](#) support arts-integrative research projects from faculty, undergraduates and graduate students across the college. Projects must be interdisciplinary in nature with an arts discipline at the core. Other disciplines to be included in a particular project can be wide-ranging, from STEM fields to humanities and social sciences.

Research Support Offices

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Scholars Programs, Undergraduate Research, and Fellowships (SURFD)

The office provides several programs that fund undergraduate researchers (RAs) who work on individual projects as well as in laboratories. Faculty can list projects when they seek RAs and may also receive requests from students looking for projects. The office also supports major fellowship advising for students (such as Fulbright, Rhodes, etc.).

Grant Proposal Support Initiative (GrantGPS)

The office helps faculty of all ranks, postdoctoral students, and graduate students navigate the grant proposal process. These services include one-on-one [consultation](#), grant editing and outside review, grant-writing training, and networking with on- and off-campus resources.

Office of Corporate and Foundation Relations

The office helps identify funding sources from corporations and foundations, assists in outreach to these institutions, and in developing proposals. Faculty can join their mailing list to receive notifications of calls for proposals.

Office of Sponsored Projects (OSP)

The office provides pre-award and post-award services and has primary responsibility for assuring Dartmouth's compliance with the regulations of funding agencies. The office also sponsors a subscription to [GrantForward](#), where you can make a profile to identify funding opportunities.

Committee for the Protection of Human Subjects (CPHS)

The committee oversees the Institutional Review Board (IRB) process for research involving human subjects. All researchers, including undergraduates, have access to the trainings offered by the Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative (CITI).

Vice Provost for Research

The Vice Provost coordinates many research functions across Dartmouth. Faculty may interact directly with the office through the "[limited submissions](#)" process for grants that require internal nominations prior to application.

Vice Provost for Entrepreneurship and Technology Transfer

The Office of Entrepreneurship and Technology Transfer (OETT), led by the Vice Provost, helps students, faculty and alumni transform their ideas into ventures through hands-on learning, mentorship, events and resources, via the [Magnuson Center for Entrepreneurship](#) and the [Technology Transfer Office](#).
